


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
## Homeward's mission


Homeward's mission is to prevent, reduce, and end homelessness by facilitating creative solutions through the collaboration, coordination and cooperation of regional resources and services.











































## What the GRCoC (homeless coalition) does not do to address housing and service needs

#### HOUSING

- •Replace the need to pay rent for most people
- •Help people find better or more suitable housing
- •Solve issues related to substandard housing
- •Replace Assisted Living Facilities
- •Replace the use of hotels as ad hoc rental housing

#### SERVICES

- Provide intensive counseling or case management to most persons served
- •Address behavioral health or other psychosocial needs comprehensively for most persons served
- •Serve people who are unable to live independently due to significant medical or behavioral health needs
- End poverty

# Predicting the need for homeless assistance

• A report by the US GAO in August 2020 "found that a \$100 increase in median rent was associated with a 9% increase in the estimated homelessness rate—even after accounting for a variety of other relevant factors, such as wages, unemployment rate, and poverty, as well as other demographic and economic characteristics." <a href="https://www.gao.gov/blog/how-covid-19-could-aggravate-homelessness-crisis">https://www.gao.gov/blog/how-covid-19-could-aggravate-homelessness-crisis</a>

•Other factors that contribute to the rates of sheltered and/ or unsheltered homelessness include:

• The availability of resources (some people can find alternative resources if there are no immediate service options available.)

- Housing market; especially rental market vacancies
- Social and support networks
- · Availability of emergency financial assistance or rent relief

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# Impact of long-term underinvestment in year-round emergency shelter programs

- Higher staff turnover; loss of institutional knowledge
- •Focus on fund development activities by agency leadership; sometimes at the expense of digging into program performance and partnership development
- •Gaps in shelter intakes (if staff are not available, shelter intakes cannot be done and beds remain empty overnight)
- Operational choices between staffing that provides required health and safety measures and expanding case management staff
- •Little to no program expansion

Increased investments in existing shelter programs could be used to increase wages for shelter staff and increase retention; expand operational hours; add key positions to support exits to housing; and, increase the numbers of people served and the number who exit to permanent housing.

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## Support people before they fall into homelessness

- Advocate for eviction diversion and prevention programs
- •Support rent relief programs and protections for tenants
- •Provide income supports to targeted households
- •Support policies such as the child tax credit that increase household stability
- Advocate for increased wages and continued access to workforce programs

# Targeted housing strategies to reduce homelessness

•Support housing programs that maintain "naturally occurring affordable housing."

•Develop permanent supportive housing dedicated to people with intensive service needs and long histories of homelessness.

Incentivize partnerships between developers and homeless service providers.
Additional points on applications for "Low Income Housing Tax Credits" for partnerships.

- •Address zoning and density issues that prohibit the development of quality multifamily housing.
- •Explore options for developing affordable and accessible housing units for older adults with significant medical needs who cannot be well-served in the homeless assistance system.
- •Improve the attractiveness of vouchers to landlords through incentives and other process improvements.

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# How you can help reduce homelessness in our community

  Share their stories and information on social media and in your networks.

•Share information on how people can get connected to services.

- Advocate at the local, state, or federal level for more resources to provide shelter and, especially, deeply affordable housing.
  - Local zoning and land use policies could have the biggest impact on increasing the supply of deeply affordable housing.

  - Support federal budgets for homeless assistance and housing resources.
  - Support policies that help people get the services they need to become stable tenants. These policies can include:
     Income supports for families with minor children
  - Health Insurance programs
  - Behavioral health resources (mental health and substance abuse)



Notification of individual or family sleeping outdoors

Are you concerned about someone sleeping outdoors? Outreach and support services are available for people living on the streets and in other public places.

Please help us to assist people who are sleeping in places not meant for human habitation (such as cars, parks, woods, sidewalks, abandoned buildings) by letting us know where they are located. Our region's outreach team will attempt to make contact with the individual or
